Fourthly there it says you are entitled to read the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984 codes of practice if you wish, the codes set out your legal rights and the rules governing the conduct of this interview. OK if you can just time and date the top of the three lines there please. Right cheers, underneath there it says I confirm that I have been re-cautioned and reminded of my legal rights. I have also been reminded that I am free to leave if I wish OK.

PW asks again a round about date for the last true account from the office. A discussion ensues at which a date is sought for the last true submitted account. During his perusal of

DB responds to HD's question in relation to how much he inflated the figure in the first false cash account he submitted by stating that it was £5,000. that he thought was possibly an error in Girobank work but he did not pursue this as an error with Girobank as he had covered the figure up in his cash account.
