## Postmistress g borrowing'

A POSTMISTRESS siphoned off almost £15,000 to keep her business running, a court was told.

Suzanne Palmer got into trouble after a snap audit uncovered false entries in the books for the Grange post office, in London Road, Rayleigh.

The jury at Southend Crown Court was told she had admitted "borrowing" the money to fill up the cash machine in her shop and improve the business's cash flow.

But she has denied three counts of false accounting, to pay the money back.

Prosecuting, Stephen John said: "Over a period of time, she dishonestly falsified the

Mrs Palmer, from Station Road, Rayleigh, was appointed sub-postmistress in 2005 and signed a contract promising to keep an honest account.

But after auditors uncovered the discrepancies in three weekly records from January and February last year, she admitted in a police interview she had been doing the same thing for weeks, possibly One way she allegedly

thing for weeks, possibly months.

One way she allegedly cooked the books was by overstating the number of Scottish or mutilated notes taken over the counter.

She is also accused of taking home thousands of pounds from the sale of scratchcards, periodically writing cheques to pay the Post Office back. After she was charged, she paid back the Post Office all the money outstanding, which by then totalled £14,700. The trial, which is expected to finish today, was delayed after a juror recognised her from school.


